## **Pupil Premium Allocation 2015-2016**

## Context

At Highbury Grove School, we have an aspiration to provide our students with a first-class education and we believe that no child should be left behind. Our ethos is that it is not about where you come from but your passion and thirst for knowledge, and your dedication and commitment to learning that make the difference between success and failure, and we are determined to ensure that our children are given every chance to realise their full potential.

Our key objective in using the Pupil Premium Grant is to narrow the gap between pupil groups. Through targeted interventions and renewed focuses on particular key areas we are working to eliminate barriers to learning and progress. Some children start the school with low attainment and our aim is to ensure that they make accelerated progress in order to reach age-related expectations and beyond as they move through the school.
